PRE-APPLICATION STEPS

- **Discuss your intention to apply to teach abroad with your academic supervisor**

APPLICATION QUESTIONS

COURSE PROPOSALS (Summer faculty teach two courses; Winter faculty teach one course)

- Faculty may submit new/original course proposals, use [existing KIIS courses](#) or view the [WKU course listings](#).
- *Note:* Accepted faculty are expected to provide their syllabi to KIIS (Summer Faculty = Oct. 15; Winter = March 15)

BUSINESS / MANAGEMENT:

International Business

This course is an overview of basic managerial functions performed by organizations doing business internationally. It helps students develop an understanding of international business issues, cultural competencies, and business skills necessary for engaging in the global marketplace. Special emphasis is given to studying the relationship between Canada and the United States, especially as it relates to NAFTA and international commerce.

ENGLISH

Warrior Poet In Japanese Literature

This course will focus on two parallel traditions—one associated with the warrior, the other with the poet in Japanese literature. We will briefly consider Heian period models, and then move to the 20th and 21st centuries. We will study texts from each tradition before treating the central figure, Mishima Yukio, whose oeuvre represents the union of the warrior and poet aesthetics. Finally, we will consider trends in contemporary Japanese fiction as exemplified by authors such as Murakami Haruki.

HISTORY:

Denmark: Viking Age to Modern State

Though in recent times a tiny nation, Denmark has often played a pivotal role in world affairs. This course will look at the broad sweep of Danish history, concentrating heavily on the country's notorious Viking past. Students will explore the country's rich collection of Viking sites, including restored villages, reconstructed ships, and well-stocked museums. Then, we will examine Denmark's transition to a medieval Christian kingdom and subsequently to a modern state. The course also explores life in Denmark under Nazi occupation.

NURSING / PUBLIC HEALTH (cross-listed):

Women's Health in Tanzania

We look at women's health in Tanzania throughout the lifespan, how it is affected by cultural, religious and socioeconomic factors (such as sexual discrimination and the use of traditional healers). We examine selected health problems which are particular for Tanzanian women such as female circumcision, high fertility rate, high maternal mortality, low contraceptive use and domestic violence. This course utilizes a holistic perspective and will be coordinated with visits to hospitals, clinics, and meetings with doctors, nurses and other health professionals.

FACULTY FAQs

1. Faculty application deadline:

- For Winter 2017-2018 KIIS programs: November 15, 2016.
- For Summer 2018 KIIS programs: March 1, 2017.

2. Acceptance notification date:

- Winter Faculty applicants will be notified in January of each year.
- Summer Faculty applicants will be notified in May of each year.

3. What is the likelihood I will be accepted? Statically, around 55% (that number is higher for some programs and lower for others). Each year, we receive more (excellent) faculty applications than positions available. Since we cannot accept all applications in a given year, we encourage faculty not selected to apply again for the following Winter and/or Summer.

4. Faculty flight options: Faculty have the option of flying with the group or flying independently. Please click [here](#) for more info.

6. How do I set up a Faculty Account and Application in the KIIS Database?

- Create a username and password.
- Then complete your profile.
- Once your profile is complete, select "My Applications and Supporting Documents."
- Click the "+" sign to "Add application" and then select by your desired "year, term and program".
- Once you have a KIIS program listed with your account, complete the following items:
 - o Upload a PDF of your CV
 - o Complete Part 1 (Proposed Courses)
 - o Complete Part 2 (Supplemental Info)
 - o Enter your Faculty Supervisor Information
 - o Part 3 (Additional Programs) is an optional section (see question #7 below).

7. Can I apply to more than one KIIS Summer program? Yes. You will create a general "Profile" and then select one program in the [MyKIIS database](#). To indicate interest in multiple KIIS programs for a specific term, complete "Part 3: Additional Programs(s)" within your desired first choice application. In the Part 3 section, you will be asked to enter your course proposals and descriptions (note: please tweak your course titles and descriptions to fit the new program location). Please do not create separate applications for each program of interest.

8. Should I notify my academic supervisor? Yes, and please provide him/her with a copy of your answers to the KIIS Faculty Application Questions (page 1 above). After you submit your online application, KIIS will contact your academic supervisor. He or she must approve of your decision to teach abroad with KIIS. Please also notify your home institution's [Study/Education Abroad Director](#) or equivalent.

9. KIIS Faculty orientations: All Faculty accepted to teach on a KIIS program, are required to attend two KIIS faculty orientations:

- Winter 2017-2018 Faculty must attend an April orientation in Bowling Green, KY and a November program-specific orientation in Elizabethtown, KY. To view orientation dates, click [here](#).
- Summer 2018 Faculty must attend a September faculty orientation in Bowling Green, KY and an April faculty and student orientation in Bowling Green, KY. To view orientation dates, click [here](#).

10. When am I expected to provide KIIS with my syllabi?

- Accepted Winter Faculty: by March 15.
- Accepted Summer Faculty: by October 1.
