ITAL 105 Introduction to Italian Culture

Course Description: Through a series of readings, discussions, and (far and away most importantly) excursions and hands-on experiences, this course will explore the development of Italy from Roman times through the modern age, using the cities of Florence and Rome as living texts which can teach us about the artistic, cultural, historical, political, and social contexts of Italy throughout its history. These explorations will provide a window into Italy's unique contributions to the world story.

Required Textbooks: In keeping with the idea that Rome and Florence themselves are our texts, I have selected two required books that use one aspect of each city (architecture and art, respectively)as windows into their history, politics, and culture. You must purchase each of these before we leave and bring them with you.

Recommended Prior Reading: While the brevity of the course makes it difficult to require these books, I HIGHLY recommend reading them prior to our departure; they are very readable and invaluable to a full understanding of place.

Film Screenings: There will be films screened on Union College's campus prior to our departure; I will make every effort to choose films that are easily accesible/streamable for free for students from other campuses to view as well. This list will be updated as I find films that fit the above criteria, to a total of (hopefully) three.

PBS, The Medici: Godfathers of the Renaissance, 2012 (3 parts)

Course Learning Objectives: By the end of the course, students will

- 1. Have a working knowledge of how the cultural, political, and social history of Rome and Florence inform the present moment of Italian history;
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of Italian (from Rome to present day) contributions to world history and culture;
- 3. Explain the historical, political, and social contexts of the art, architecture, literature, and cuisine experienced during the course.
- 4. Meaningfully and effectively communicate the experience of encountering a different culture

Tentative Assignments: Detailed instructions and expectations for the following forthcoming:

"Mapping" Florence and Rome: an assignment demonstrating LO 1 on either a micro (specific building/Street/neighborhood, etc.) or macro level.

"Culture in Context" Journal: a daily journal, informed by the required readings, which will both analyze (examine in terms of its constituent parts) and reflect (explain one's personal aesthetic/spiritual/other reactions to) the excursions, sights, and experiences of the day, in accordance with Los 3 and 4.

Final paper: the above assignments will inform a final paper submitted by the student, wherein he or she will turn from an examination of Italy in the context of itself to Italy as contributor to the world at large, per LO 2.

Grades: The course will be graded with roughly 1/3 of the final grade coming from each assignment above. Other minor coursework or quizzes may also be included in the calculation of the final grade.

Attendance Policy

KIIS program participants are expected to be punctual to and in attendance at all classes, presentations, meetings and required excursions, and to remain with the program for the full academic period. Unexcused absences from classes and/or mandatory meetings will result in a lowering of the student's final grade, as will excessive tardiness. Multiple unexcused absences could result in expulsion from the program. Any absence from an academic class session must be excused for medical reasons.
