1. Course Description:

We will look at France as a case study for the analysis of key concepts in International Relations (IR), such as power politics, economics, cultural identity, immigration, democracy and repression, among others. Politics is everywhere. It is in places of history, museums, and cafés. It is in sport events and in artistic expressions. It is in the subways, in graffiti on the walls, with people on the streets, in daily events, in architecture, and even in cemeteries. Together, in groups and individually, we will explore places and people (even food!), and use imagery (photography and video) as 'visual texts'. These (and other) materials will serve as visual evidences for analytical discussions, presentations, and the writing of analytical journals, with the goal of building together a coherent picture of politics of France.

- Use visual information as "visual texts" and "visual evidences", as they apply to politics;
- Demonstrate effective presentation skills, particularly as they relate to visual modes of communication;
- Evaluate similarities and differences in political contents from multiple social spaces (i.e., USA vs. France, Your City vs. Paris).

Place-as-Texts Reports: Participation and full engagement in excursions, city walks and events are a central part of study-abroad programs. For such activities, there will be short written assignments (accompanied by at least one, but no more than three, student-taken photograph(s)) in which the students are expected to critically connect their experiences and what they see with political topics and concepts covered with the class materials. Details on these assignments will be provided to the students. Those reports will count for 25% of the final grade for the class.

Reading Notes: Students will provide short analytical notes on the content materials for this class, which includes readings, YouTube Videos, Podcasts, the English version of the news source Le Monde Diplomatique, and any other material that the instructor provides. Details on these assignments will be provided to the students. These reports (which may include predepartment assignments) will count for 20% of the final grade for the class.

Visual Texts - Photo Analysis: Throughout the course, students will explore the city and collect 'visual evidences' of their experiences and their relation to political topics covered in this class. As such, they will make three short presentations about those visual materials, which, together, will count for 25% of their final grade. Details on these assignments will be provided.

Visual Texts - Final Video Presentation: For our final assignment for this class, students will prepare a short video (5-8 minutes long) about their time in Paris. The video may focus on one or more specific political topics covered in the class, or it may be a more personal and yet critical reflection on political topics as they saw them manifest during their stay in Paris. Details on the assignment (including on the technical aspects for the making of the video) will be provided. The final visual presentation will count for 15% of the final grade for the class.

Active Participation / Engagement: In the excitement of being in a new country, exploring a stunning city such as Paris, while making new friends, one may lose sight of the main purpose for such a unique journey: academic learning. Active participation and full critical engagement in excursions, class debates, and political topics covered are central for the success of this class, both to each student and for the group as a whole. Students are expected to be mindful of their analytical responsibilities for this class, which will count for 15% of their final grade.

8. Attendance Policy:

KIIS program participants are expected to be punctual to and in attendance at all classes, presentations, meetings and required excursions, and to remain with the program for the full academic period. Unexcused absences from classes and/or mandatory meetings will result in a lowering of the student's final grade, as will excessive tardiness. Multiple unexcused absences could result in expulsion from the program. Any absence from an academic class session must be excused for medical reasons.

9. Disability Accommodation:

KIIS will make every reasonable effort to provide accommodations for program participants with special needs or disabilities, but we cannot guarantee that we will be able to do so. Be aware that many foreign countries do not have comprehensive legislation comparable to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
