1. Course Description:

In this course, we will engage in an interdisciplinary introduction to the cultures and societies of Latin America including exposure to the Latinx community in the U.S. You will gain an understanding of the major processes that have shaped Latin America in the past and continue to affect the region today. Among the themes that we will explore are gender and community, revolution and rebirth, forging identity, and ecotourism and sustainability. Special attention will be given to the context of these themes in Costa Rica. "On site" learning will be a critical component of the course. **Note:** *Students receiving Spanish credit must complete written work in Spanish.*

3. Course Objectives and Specific Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, you will have met the following goals:

• You will have familiarity with the main historical periods of the evolution and development of Latin America, from the pre-Columbian past to the present day. By the end of the course, you should be able to cite and think critically about the historical events, economic conditions, and social and racial dynamics of the region.

- You will have an understanding of Latin America not as a monolithic, homogenous bloc, but as a place of diverse cultures, peoples, and sets of concerns. You will understand this diversity as both synchronic (through space) and diachronic (through time).
- You will understand Latin America as a product of *encounters*; i.e. as a crossroads between indigenous societies, European traditions and U.S. influence that has resulted in cultural (and other kinds of) hybridity.
- You will be able to think critically about the ways in which these variegated influences have not simply been assimilated from without, but have contributed to unique and entirely new societies within Latin America that must be understood on their own terms.

8. Attendance Policy:

Students are expected to attend all class sessions, contribute actively to discussion, and participate in group excursions that require walking or hiking to local sites. Much of your learning will take place during this last type of activity and you are expected to document them by taking notes or photographs (when applicable and appropriate) or as directed. You will typically be paired or working in small groups during these out-of-class experiences and will be communicating with locals **in Spanish**; therefore, pairs or small groups will be established early in the course that include students with intermediate or advanced Spanish-language competency. You must keep up with all assigned reading as well as turn in writing assignments and deliver presentations as scheduled. Exceptions will only be made in extenuating circumstances (such as a debilitating illness).

KIIS program participants are expected to be punctual to and in attendance at all classes, presentations, meetings and required excursions, and to remain with the program for the full academic period. Unexcused absences from classes and/or mandatory meetings will result in a lowering of the student's final grade, as will excessive tardiness. Multiple unexcused absences could result in expulsion from the program. Any absence from an academic class session must be excused for medical reasons.

9. Disability Accommodation:

KIIS will make every reasonable effort to provide accommodations for program participants with special needs or disabilities, but we cannot guarantee that we will be able to do so. Be aware that many foreign countries do not have comprehensive legislation comparable to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). As a result, businesses and other establishments operating in foreign countries may not be able to provide accommodations.

In some cases, you may need to make arrangements for a caregiver to join you on your KIIS program, should your physician, campus disability accommodation office, or KIIS make such a recommendation or require it.
