ENG 290 / HON 300 Creativity and Identity in Rome, Florence & Siena

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Tentative Syllabus: subject to change

Course Description:

This course engages students with particularities of Italian social life and cultural identity through selected readings, self-guided explorations, interactive encounters, descriptive and imaginative writing and creative responses (such as videos, photography, and drawing), and through group activities such as place-as-text observations and analyses of the cultural spaces and the distinctive neighborhoods of Rome, Florence and Siena. It takes inspiration from the ways in which travelers and writers of the past have also encountered Italy and memorialized their experiences in creative works that contribute to the Italy of the imagination. The course includes in-depth exploration of the streets, piazzas, art and architecture of these Italian cities, and is designed to enable students to identify and appreciate aspects of Italian life and the cultural landscape that might otherwise remain hidden in plain sight to the average visitor.



This course may be used to fulfill General Education Requirements, which vary depending upon home institution. E.g., at EKU, the course could satisfy Element 3 Arts & Humanities, Element 5 Social Sciences, or Element 6 Diversity. Check with your home institution's study abroad office.

Texts:

Required Texts (in hard copy or digital format):

- 1) Selected readings by Moravia, Pasolini, George Eliot, Stendhal, Henry James and others, from *Italian Short Stories* (Penguin), *Rome Tales* (Oxford), *Rome Stories* (Everyman's Library/Penguin) – compiled in course PDFs.
- 2) Selected poems by du Bellay, Goethe, Barrett Browning and others, compiled in course PDF.
- 3) Other online materials TBA.

Student Learning Outcomes

This course will provide:

- 1) Interactive knowledge of Italian cities, neighborhoods, and cultural identity:

- a. An informed acquaintance with significant features of traditional and contemporary Italian society, cityscapes and culture, through discussion of readings, self-guided learning explorations and a variety of writing exercises combining observation, interaction and creative response.
 - b. An appreciation of the distinctiveness of Italian social and cultural space
 - c. Class visits to major cultural sites in Florence, Rome, Siena, Assisi and Tivoli
- 2) Intellectual and practical skills, including:
- a. Developed capacity for critical thinking and detailed observation
 - b. Increased proficiency in reading, writing and speaking
 - c. Creative interpretation and response to cultural experiences
- 3) Personal and social responsibility, including:
- a. An understanding of society and human behavior
 - b. The role of artistic expressions in the development of cultural identity
 - c. The importance of community and cultural factors in the formation of identity
 - d. Familiarity with intercultural encounters and interaction

Except for cameras and readers, no electronic devices are permitted while class is underway. Any student who uses an electronic device during class will be counted absent (see Attendance Policy).

Graded Work – submit to Google Classrooms page (COURSE CODE: TBA)

Students will attend and participate in all classes, discuss readings and how they relate to on site experiences, complete writing exercises and other creative responses to be submitted in the form of journals for review, comment and grading, at designated points throughout the course. See *Submission* dates in the Schedule (below). By the end of the course, your Journal must include the following:

4 Observational and Creative Response Journals taking inspiration from course readings, excursions, small group activities and individual exploration. There is no required length, since these exercises will take many different forms, including descriptive essays, short stories, poems, etc. Each submission must be full, rich and developed, and continuing submissions must take feedback and recommendations into account. Some exercises will be required (TBA) and some will be free choice. Students will submit a selection of their best work to the course portfolio.

Each of the submissions is of equal weight.

All work will be evaluated in terms of completeness, carefulness of execution and clarity of expression.

Journals must be submitted to the course [Google Classrooms](#) page (COURSE CODE: TBA) or in case of glitches or other difficulties they may be submitted in PDF (preferred) or DOCX format electronically to both instructors at erik.liddell@eku.edu and Kelly.liddell@eku.edu or they may be delivered on a flash drive in PDF or DOCX format.

Students must participate in all classes.

Assignments will be graded on a 100-point scale.

These requirements are weighted as follows in calculating final grades:

- Journals: 75%
- Class attendance, active participation: 25%

All formal assignments will be graded on a 100-point scale and converted to letter grades on the following basis: 90-100=A; 80-89=B; 70-79=C; 60-69=D; below 60=F. Final grades will not be rounded up; so, for example, an average of 89.9 is a B, not an A.

All work submitted for grade should be your own or properly attributed. Cases of plagiarism or dishonesty will result in a failing grade for the course and will be reported to the appropriate university authorities.

Students with learning disabilities or any other difficulty which might prevent them from fulfilling the course requirements should speak with the professor early in the semester. Together we can consider alternative methods of evaluation.

Materials and Preparation

Required readings must be purchased by students in advance of the course. All texts are available in paperback and electronic formats. Additional materials, such as online resources, extra readings, will be made available electronically and in hard copy when possible. Assigned readings and film screenings must be completed by the dates given in the syllabus. In order for the class to have lively discussions about the material, everyone needs to complete assignments on time and be prepared to share thoughts about them.

Attendance Policy and Class Notes.

Attendance is mandatory and roll will be taken for all course components (classes and excursions). It is vital that you register at each class meeting—and this is *your* responsibility. Any student who uses an electronic device during class, other than a camera or a reader, and any student who appears more than fifteen minutes after class begins, will be counted absent. If you miss two classes your final grade will be reduced by 5 points on the 100-point scale. If you miss three classes your final grade will be reduced by 10 points. If you miss four classes your final grade will be reduced by 15 points. If you miss five classes your final grade will be reduced by 20 marks. If you miss six or more classes you will receive a failing grade (F) for the course. You are advised to take accurate and detailed notes about all course elements. These, augmented by required readings, will provide the material for your written reflections and responses.

Overall KIIS Program Student Learning Outcomes

KIIS Study Abroad Mission Statement:

KIIS provides high-quality education abroad programs for students from all diverse backgrounds that promote deep international learning, are integrated into the curriculum, and encourage critical and creative thinking. Our goal is to help students understand the wider world and develop personal and professional skills for lifelong enrichment. We strive to go beyond generalizations and cultural stereotypes to help foster a nuanced appreciation of the world in which we live.

Students participating on KIIS study abroad programs aim to:

- 1) Understand contemporary issues of their host country/countries (i.e. KIIS program location).
- 2) Develop skills to interact comfortably in a global setting.
- 3) Understand other cultures.

Prior to your KIIS study abroad program, and again at the conclusion of your program, KIIS will ask each student to a) answer a few multiple-choice questions, and b) write a short reflective essay (two paragraphs in length) related to the elements detailed above. There is no right or wrong answer, and your responses will not affect your grade in any way. The purpose of the exercise is to help KIIS measure the effectiveness of its study abroad programs.

Attendance Policy

KIIS program participants are expected to be punctual to and in attendance at all classes, presentations, meetings and required excursions, and to remain with the program for the full academic period. Unexcused absences from classes and/or mandatory meetings will result in a lowering of the student's final grade, as will excessive tardiness. Multiple unexcused absences could result in expulsion from the program. Any absence from an academic class session must be excused for medical reasons.

Disability Accommodation

KIIS will make every reasonable effort to provide accommodations for program participants with special needs or disabilities, but we cannot guarantee that we will be able to do so. Be aware that many foreign countries do not have comprehensive legislation comparable to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). In some cases, you may need to make arrangements for a caregiver to join you on your KIIS program, should your physician, campus disability accommodation office, or KIIS make such a recommendation or require it.
