FILM 399, HON 300: Topics--Berlin in Film

1. Course Description:

This course centers on the portrayal of Germany, and specifically Berlin, in German and American cinema. We will examine how the city and its history have captured the imagination of international filmmakers and what tools they have employed to convey the capital's spirit of place from the interwar period to today. Students are expected to view most films in advance; class in Berlin will focus on selected clips, readings, and excursions to the sites that are central to the films, for example Glienicke Bridge (→Bridge of Spies), Bornholmer Strasse (→Bornholmer Strasse), Hitler's bunker (→Downfall), and the Stasi prison in Hohenschönhausen (→The Lives of Others), among others.

2. Overall KIIS Program Student Learning Outcomes:

- 3) Understand other cultures.

Prior to your KIIS study abroad program, and again at the conclusion of your program, KIIS will ask each student to a) answer a few multiple-choice questions, and b) write a short reflective essay (two paragraphs in length) related to the elements detailed above. There is no right or wrong answer, and your responses will not affect your grade in any way. The purpose of the exercise is to help KIIS measure the effectiveness of its study abroad programs.

3. Course Objectives and Specific Learning Outcomes:

Students will demonstrate:

- knowledge of artists' aesthetic and psychological engagement with Berlin in various moments of time;
- knowledge of generic conventions of film;
- the ability to engage in authentic field experiences in collaboration with their peers.

Additional Assignment for Honors Students:

- Option #1: Honors students must prepare a guided 4-hour tour through Berlin. The tour must help bring to life elements of the films we have studied or will study
- Option #2: Honors students must prepare 7-10-page pass/fail written reflection comparing the representation of Berlin and German culture in literature and film focusing on Giles Whittell's Bridge of Spies / Steven Spielberg's Bridge of Spies or Antony Johnston's The Coldest City / David Leitch's Atomic Blonde.

6. Attendance Policy:

KIIS program participants are expected to be punctual to and in attendance at all classes, presentations, meetings and required excursions, and to remain with the program for the full academic period. Unexcused absences from classes and/or mandatory meetings will result in a lowering of the student's final grade, as will excessive tardiness. Multiple unexcused absences could result in expulsion from the program. Any absence from an academic class session must be excused for medical reasons.

7. Disability Accommodation:

KIIS will make every reasonable effort to provide accommodations for program participants with special needs or disabilities, but we cannot guarantee that we will be able to do so. Be aware that many foreign countries do not have comprehensive legislation comparable to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
