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### SOC XXX: Consuming Culture in Paris

**1. Course Description:** This course is a study of Paris as a global “capital of culture” and the influences it has had on other cultures around the world. Drawing on ideas about cultural capital, we will explore sites of both material and non-material cultural production and consumption in Paris, from the city's world-renowned cafés, department stores, and shopping districts to its museums, historic sites, and green spaces. As we do so, we will examine ideas from other cultures about what it means to be “cultured” and explore how Paris has both influenced and been influenced by places and people beyond the borders of France.

### 2. Overall KIIS Program Student Learning Outcomes:

KIIS Study Abroad Mission Statement:

KIIS provides high-quality education abroad programs for students from all diverse backgrounds that promote deep international learning, are integrated into the curriculum, and encourage critical and creative thinking. Our goal is to help students understand the wider world and develop personal and professional skills for lifelong enrichment. We strive to go beyond generalizations and cultural stereotypes to help foster a nuanced appreciation of the world in which we live.

Students participating on KIIS study abroad programs aim to:

- 1) Understand contemporary issues of their host country/countries (i.e. KIIS program location).
- 2) Develop skills to interact comfortably in a global setting.
- 3) Understand other cultures.

Prior to your KIIS study abroad program, and again at the conclusion of your program, KIIS will ask each student to a) answer a few multiple-choice questions, and b) write a short reflective essay (two paragraphs in length) related to the elements detailed above. There is no right or wrong answer, and your responses will not affect your grade in any way. The purpose of the exercise is to help KIIS measure the effectiveness of its study abroad programs.

### 3. Course Objectives and Specific Learning Outcomes:

- Compare and evaluate ideas about what constitutes “culture.”
- Define and apply the concepts of cultural capital and cultural hegemony to Parisian culture and its global influence.
- Understand the concept of social constructionism and how Paris has been constructed over time as a global “capital of culture.”
- Become familiar with essential sites of cultural production and consumption in Paris and gain a basic understanding of their history and significance.
- Analyze the implications of colonialism on culture around the world and post-colonial challenges to French/European cultural hegemony.

#### **4. Major Topics covered in the Course:**

Culture, cultural capital, and cultural hegemony

Social constructionism

History and culture of Paris

Colonialism/post-colonialism

**5. Fulfillment of General Education Requirement:** This course will be designed to complete a general education international perspective, pending institutional approval.

**6. Required Readings and Materials:** There is no required text for this course; all readings will be posted to our course LMS.

#### **7. Graded Assignments:**

20% - Class participation (including reading quizzes to prepare for discussion)

20% - Analysis of a historically significant cultural site in Paris

20% - Analysis of a contemporary cultural influence on Paris

40% - Site visit reflections

#### **8. Attendance Policy:**

KIIS program participants are expected to be punctual to and in attendance at all classes, presentations, meetings and required excursions, and to remain with the program for the full academic period. Unexcused absences from classes and/or mandatory meetings will result in a lowering of the student's final grade, as will excessive tardiness. Multiple unexcused absences could result in expulsion from the program. Any absence from an academic class session must be excused for medical reasons.

#### **9. Disability Accommodation:**
